Before joining UNSW Law in 2010, Sarah was the Dorset Fellow in Public International Law at the British Institute of International and Comparative Law, a Senior Legal Researcher at the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office, and a Lecturer at Durham Law School, University of Durham. She has also worked as a commercial solicitor in London and Sydney. Sarah has acted as a consultant to the European Commission, the British Red Cross, the International Federation of the Red Cross and the British Institute of International and Comparative Law.

Sarah is currently the co-editor of the PIL Current Developments section of the *International and Comparative Law Quarterly*. Her research areas include international law, in particular international criminal law, international humanitarian law and the law on the use of force. Sarah's book, on Internationalized Criminal Tribunals, is soon to be published.



Dr Shirley Scott

Shirley Scott is an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences and is at the forefront of interdisciplinary scholarship on International Law and International Relations. Shirley has published widely on aspects of international law including the use of force, climate change, international law and Australian foreign policy, and the nature of US engagement with international law. She has also undertaken theoretical work on the place of international law in world politics. Shirley is the author of a leading textbook in the field, *International Law in World Politics: an Introduction* and its companion, *International Law and Politics: Key Documents*. Shirley is the Research Chair of the Australian Institute of International Affairs and a member of the executive council of the Asian Society of International Law. Forthcoming publications include *US Power: The United States Quest for Legal Security* (Cambridge University Press, 2012) and *International Law in the Era of Climate Change* (edited jointly with Prof. Rosemary Rayfuse, Edward Elgar, 2012).

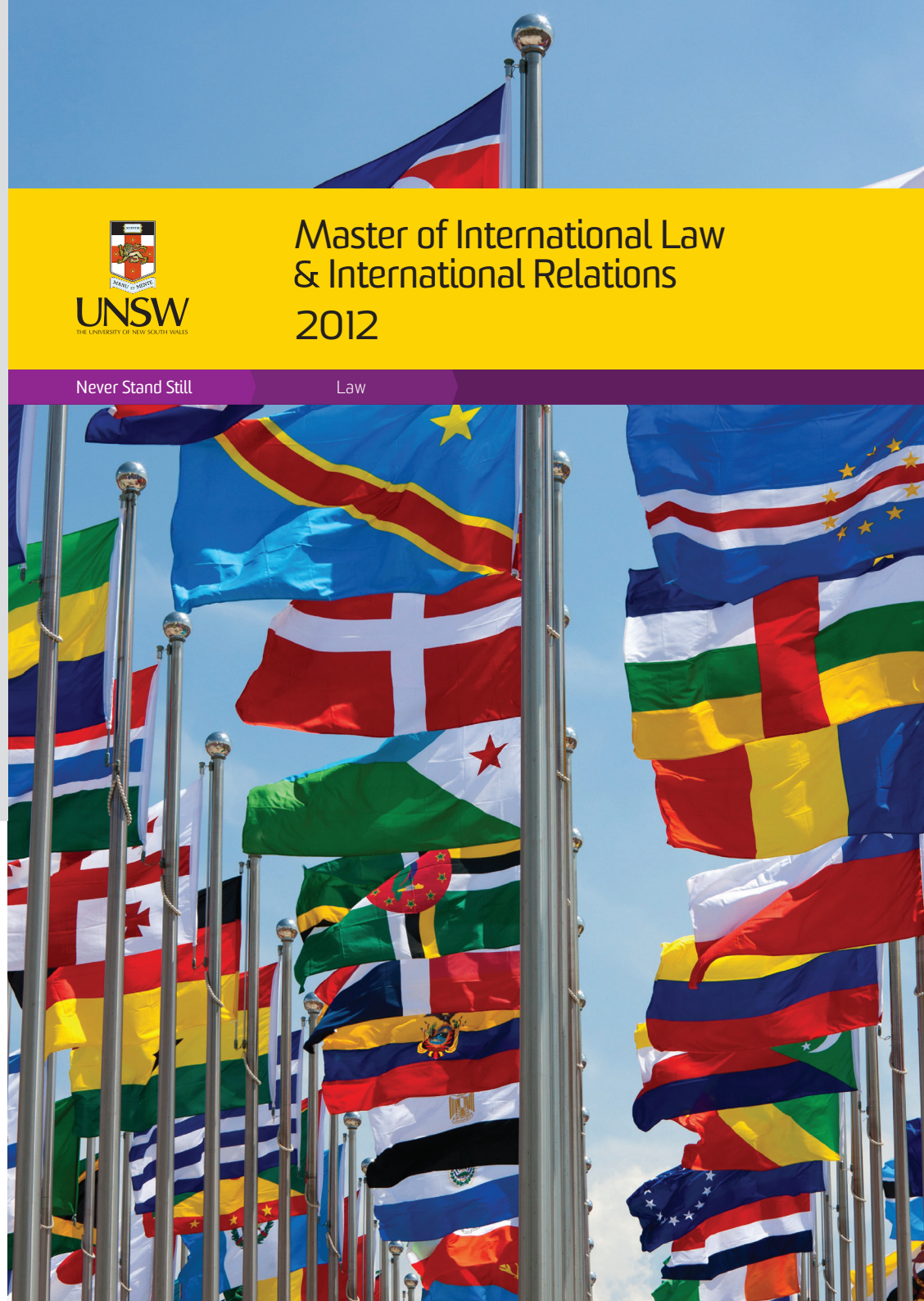

There is virtually no area of world politics in which international law does not play a role and international law cannot be fully understood without an appreciation of the political context in which it operates.

The Master of International Law & International Relations provides an interdisciplinary study program for students with backgrounds in law, the social sciences or humanities who are interested in a career in international law and international relations. It provides students with a strong theoretical and practical understanding of the international legal system, the workings of international politics and their effect on each other.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE

Students are required to complete two compulsory courses (12 uoc) in the first year of study, then choose half of their elective courses from the Law courses offered and half from the International Relations and Politics courses offered by the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

This program does not lead to a professional qualification for legal practice.

Students will gain both a strong theoretical and practical understanding of the international legal system, the workings of international politics and their effect on each other.
